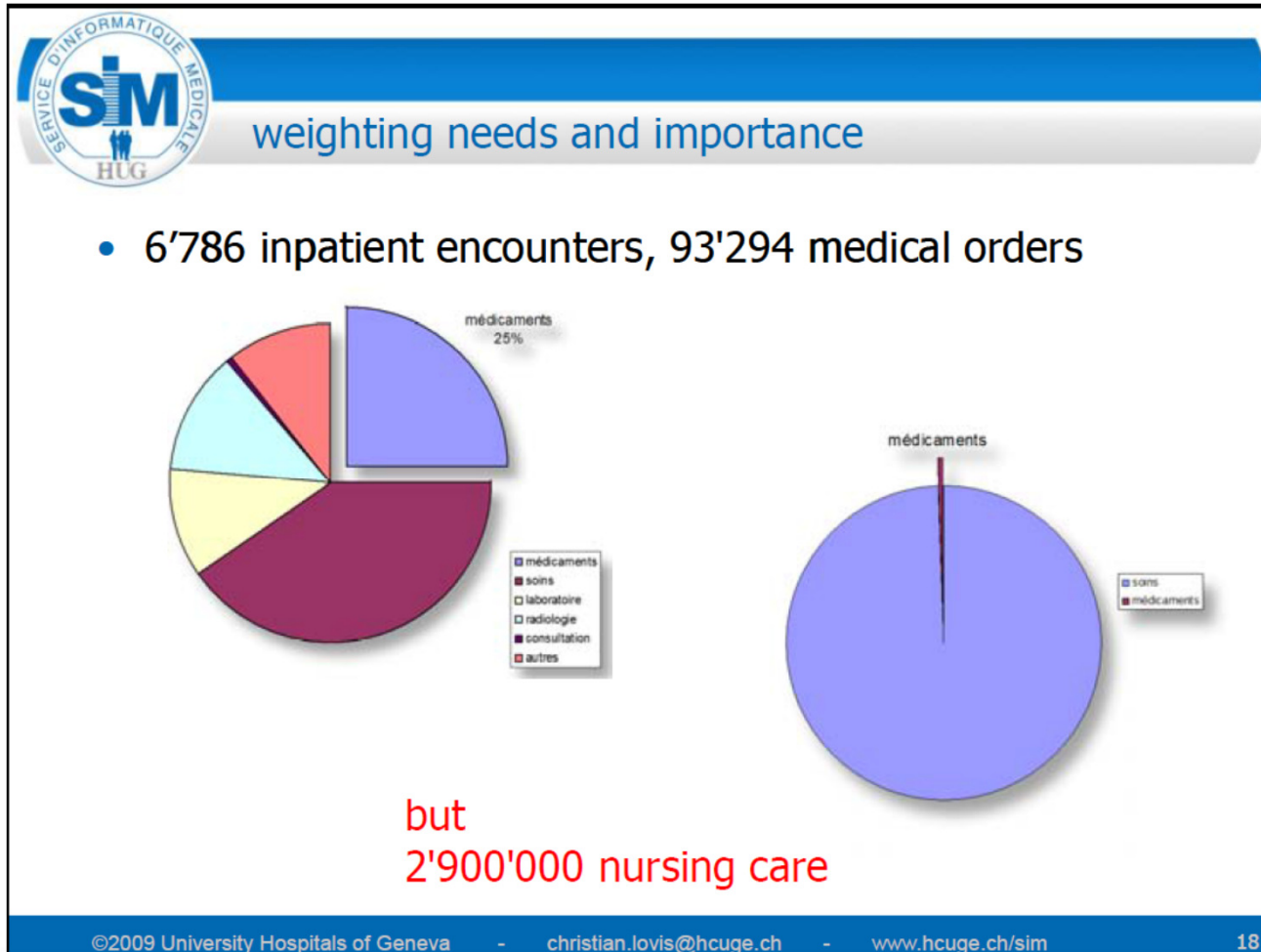
Expert Group on Safe Medication Practices (P-SP-PH/SAFE)

The recommendations were adopted by the Committee of Ministers on 24 May 2006 (Council of Europe Recommendation Rec(2006)7).





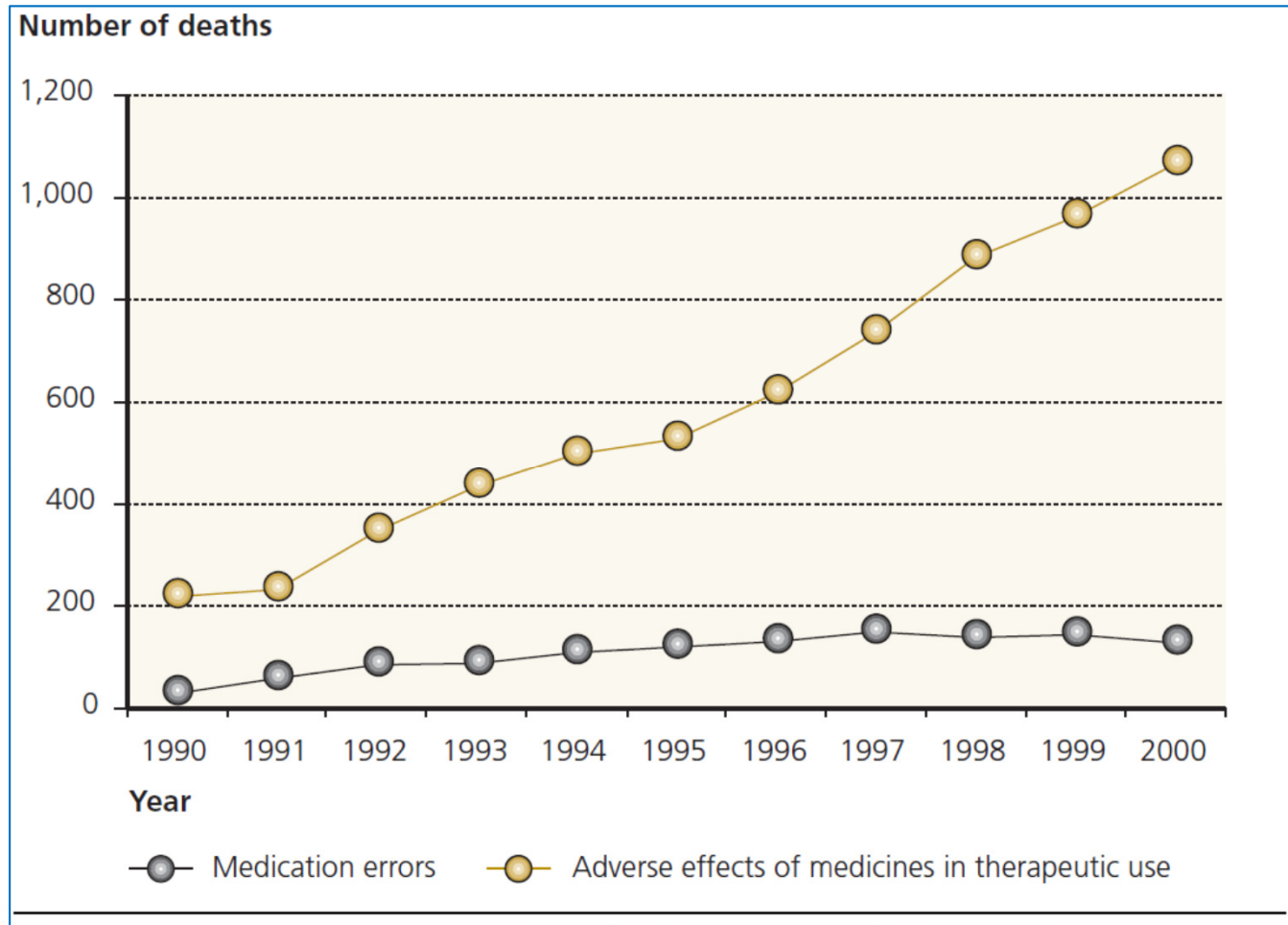

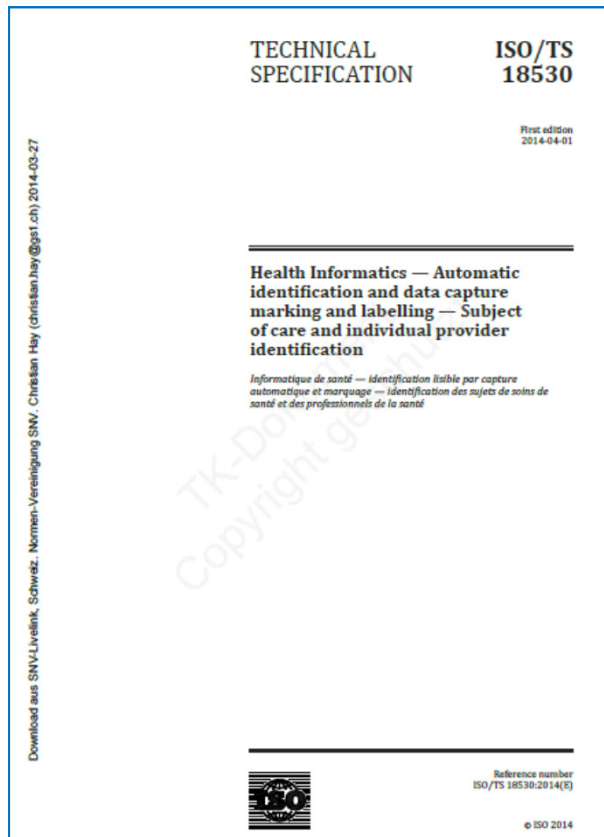

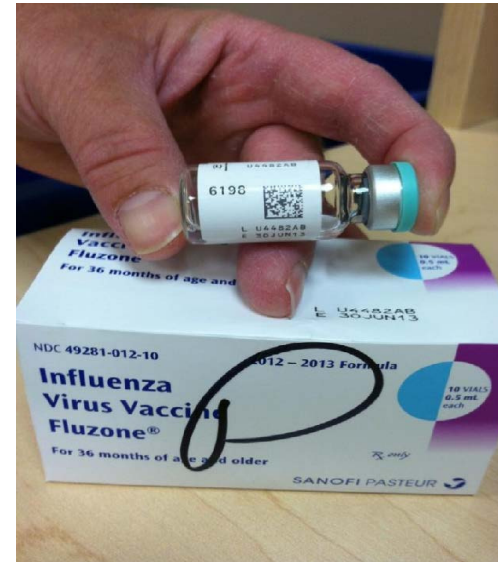
